I want to personally invite you to get outside your comfort zone, have fun and compete this year. If you know an auctioneer that is just beginning to develop their skills, encourage them to join our association and enter the rookie division. They are the future of our industry and if we do not encourage them, the live auctioneer will not be around long. If you yourself have ever competed or thought about competing, please enter this year - it may just be your year!
